Together with the publisher of the journal, Wolters Kluwer, I am pleased to announce our annual competition to recognize the top Resident paper for the academic year 2017. The winning paper will be published in a forthcoming issue of the *Journal of Psychiatric Practice*. In addition, the primary Resident author will be invited to serve a 1-year term during 2018–2019 as a special Resident representative on the Editorial Board of the journal and will be invited to attend the Editorial Board Meeting during the 2018 annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. (If the winning resident cannot attend the meeting, he or she will receive a \$500 award to use toward education expenses.) The winner will also receive a certificate from the *Journal of Psychiatric Practice* in recognition of this achievement.

When selecting the winning paper, the following criteria will be used:

- Originality
- Clinical relevance
- Scholarship
- Readability
- Overall value to the field of psychiatry

To participate in this competition, papers must be received by November 30, 2017. Review articles and papers based on original clinical research (but not single case reports), whose primary author is a resident, will qualify for the award. Submit all manuscripts to the Journal of Psychiatric Practice Editorial Manager website (www.editorialmanager.com/pr), selecting resident paper submission as the type of article. PREPARATION OF MANUSCRIPT

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Title page: manuscript title; authors' full names, highest academic degrees, and affiliations; name, address, telephone number, and email for corresponding author; sources of support requiring acknowledgment, and

disclosure of funding for this work from any of the following organizations: National Institutes of Health (NIH); Wellcome Trust; Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI); or industry.

Abstract and key words: 250 words plus at least 5 key words.

Text: Use headings to clarify organization. Indicate where tables and figures should appear. Define abbreviations at first mention in the text and in each table and figure.

References: Authors are responsible for accuracy of references. Place references at end of the manuscript and cite numerically in text in order of appearance. Cite unpublished data (papers submitted but not accepted, personal communications) in parentheses in the text. If more than 3 authors, list first three and then use et al. Use Index Medicus abbreviations for journal names (www.nlm.nih.gov/tsd/serials/lji.html). Samples are given below:

Figures: Cite and number figures consecutively in the text. Submit figures in electronic form (e.g., pdf, tiff, eps files). Include brief legends for figures at the end of the manuscript.

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
